

JENNIFER BELL

Colorado Xplosion (ABL), 1997

ALBENA BRANZOVA

PROFESSIONAL: Drafted in the third round by the WNBA's New York Liberty in 1998... Played in 11 games, averaging 2.1 points and 1.5 rebounds... Scored a career-high five points versus the Utah Starzz... Continued to play professionally in the EuroLeague with Nadezhda Orenburg in Russia.

COLLEGE: A two-time All-American, Branzova played from 1991-95... Was the first of three players to have a jersey retired by the Panthers... Competed in two NCAA Tournaments and two WNIT Tournaments... Scored 26 points to help give FIU its first NCAA Tournament victory with an 81-76 win over Old Dominion... Remains the program's scoring leader with 2,515 points—including a school-record 45 points versus Marquette on March 27, 1993, and continues to rank first in career field goals (1,033), career field goal percentage (.607), career three-point field goal percentage (.416), and career rebounds (1,092)... At time of graduation, was one of just two players in the state of Florida to reach the 2,000-point, 1,000-rebound plateau... A three-time All-TAAC selection, was named to the Atlantic Sun Conference's (formerly the TAAC) 25th Anniversary Team.

GERGANA BRANZOVA

PROFESSIONAL: Selected by Detroit in the third round of the 1998 WNBA Draft... Played in 26 games, averaging 2.7 points and 1.6 rebounds... Scored a career-high 11 points versus Washington... Averaged 13.8 points and 10.7 rebounds over six games in the 2008 European Championships with Bulgaria... Continues to play professionally in Europe with the Turkish team Fenerbahce Istanbul.

COLLEGE: A two-time All-TAAC selection, Branzova played for FIU from 1994-98 and earned second team All-America honors as a senior... Finished her career with 1,339 points which ranks ninth in FIU history... Currently ranks first in career free throw percentage (.811), second in career field goal percentage (.578), seventh in career blocked shots (74) and 10th in career free throws (245)... In 1998, she averaged 17.3 points per game and finished eighth in the NCAA in field goal percentage (.620)... Became just the 15th player in FIU history to record at least 500 points in a single season when she had 537 as a senior.


DALMA IVÁNYI

PROFESSIONAL: In 2006, Iványi ranked second in the EuroLeague in assists, averaging 5.7 per game and a team-high 6.2 rebounds and 11.9 points per outing for MiZo-Pécs... In 2005, signed a free-agent contract with the WNBA's San Antonio Silver Stars, making 14 starts in 30 games played... Averaged 2.5 points and 2.3 assists per game, while shooting a team-high 44.4 percent from three-point range... In 2004, selected to the All-Star Five after leading MiZo-Pécs to the FIBA EuroLeague Women's Final Four for the second-straight season... Started the 2003 season with the Phoenix Mercury after playing in Europe the previous three years... One of only 10 college players taken in the 1999 draft, picked in the fourth round by the Utah Starzz... Started 16 games in 2002, playing in 27... Averaged 3.4 points, 2.0 rebounds and 2.3 assists per game... Dished out a game-high seven assists and grabbed a game-high four steals in Utah's win over Seattle... In 1999, played in 14 games, averaging 0.8 points and 0.5 assists... Played for the Hungarian National Team at the EuroBasket Final Round in 1997, 2001 and 2003.

COLLEGE: A two-time All-American, Iványi played from 1995-99... One of three FIU players with a jersey retired by the Panthers... Competed in three NCAA Tournaments... In the program's career record book, ranks first in steals (376), second in assists (896) and sixth in points (1,499)... As a senior, averaged 15.0 points, 3.8 rebounds and 8.8 assists per game, shooting 40.6 percent from three-point range to garner third team All-America honors by the Associated Press... 1998 Sun Belt Conference Defensive Player of the Year and 1997 Trans America Athletic Conference Player of the Year... In 2005, named to the Sun Belt Conference's 30-Year Anniversary Team.

ANDREA NAGY

PROFESSIONAL: Nagy played professionally for seven seasons before retiring in 2003... Traded by the New York Liberty to the Sacramento Monarchs at the beginning of 2002 season... Started eight games with the Monarchs, averaging three assists per game in 24 appearances... Ranked third in the league with 7.1 assists per 40 minutes average... Selected by the Mystics in the third round of the 1999 WNBA Draft... In two seasons with the Washington Mystics, started every game she played... The 2000 season was highlighted by 10-assist performance against Sacramento, leading to a fifth-place finish overall in assists (118)... Started 23 games, averaging 4.2 points, 2.7 rebounds and 5.1 assists... In 1999, started all 32 games, finishing seventh in the league in assists, averaging 4.6 per game... Also averaged 5.1 points and shot 76.3 percent from the free throw line... In 1996, Seattle selected Nagy in the fourth round of the ABL Draft... Played in 39 games and finished second on the team in assists (113), fifth in steals (34) and ninth in scoring (3.8)... In 1997, played for Long Beach, leading the Stingrays to the finals... Finished third in the league in assists (273) and averaged 7.6 points per game.


Andrea Nagy

COLLEGE: One of the greatest players in school history, Nagy played for FIU from 1991-95... One of three players with a jersey retired by the Panthers... Helped FIU to two NCAA Tournament appearances and finished her career averaging 14.5 points, 3.6 rebounds and 9.4 assists—the fourth-best assist average in NCAA history... Her 1,165 assists are second- best all-time in NCAA history and an FIU record... Ranks fourth in school history with 1,812 career points... Led the nation in 1994 with 10.3 assists per game and was selected first team All-America by Kodak, United States Basketball Writer's Association and USA Today... Named to the Atlantic Sun Conference's (formerly the TAAC) 25th Anniversary Team.

LYNETTE RICHARDSON

Miami Tropics (USBL), 1987

GERGANA SLAVTCHEVA

PROFESSIONAL: Played 2003 season in the WNBA with the Phoenix Mercury... Was drafted in the second round by the Los Angeles Sparks in 2002—the highest round of any FIU player picked in the WNBA Draft.

COLLEGE: The queen of three-point range, Slavtcheva played at FIU from 1998-2002... Set the previous school record for three-point baskets made in a season with 57 as a sophomore... Broke that mark the following season, hitting 58 from beyond the arc... Reigned as all-time school leader in three-pointers made (172) and attempted (492) for eight years... Produced two career triple-doubles... Left FIU third in points (1,823), fifth in rebounds (729), tied for fourth in assists (376) and seventh in steals (188)... Three-time All-Sun Belt Conference honoree, five-time SBC Player of the Week and three-time tournament MVP... Averaged 15.2 points, 6.3 rebounds and 3.1 assists per game... Posted double-figure points in 82 games and scored 20 or more points 35 times... In 2005, named to the Sun Belt Conference's 30-Year Anniversary Team.
